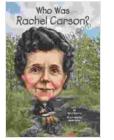
# Who Was Rachel Carson? The Life and Legacy of a Pioneering Environmentalist

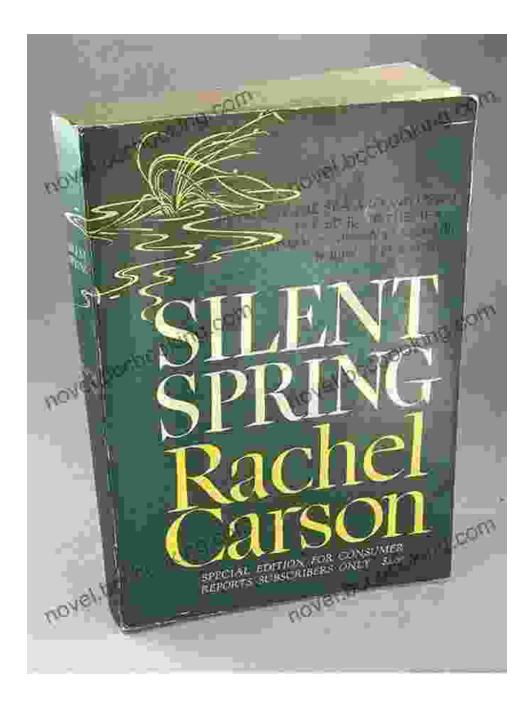

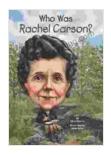
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#### Carson's Legacy

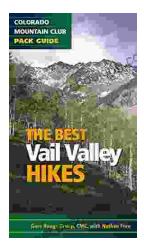
